

Minutes of the meeting held under the Chairmanship of Chief Secretary, GoMP, on 13/02/2019 in compliance of the order passed by the Hon'ble National Green Tribunal, New Delhi in OA No. 606/2018, dated 16-01-2019

The meeting was held under the chairmanship of the Chief Secretary with the Principal Secretaries and officers of the concerned departments. The list of officials present during the meeting is annexed as Annexure-1.

With the permission of the chair, Principal Secretary (Environment) submitted that Hon'ble National Green Tribunal, New Delhi (NGT) had directed by its order dated 16/01/2019 in OA No. 606/2018 that the Chief Secretary had to review the progress by holding the first meeting within one month from the date of issue of the order and apprise the Hon'ble NGT in person on 15/04/2019 on following issues:

- A. Compliance of Solid Waste Management Rules, 2016, Plastic Waste Management Rules, 2016 and Bio-Medical Waste Management Rules, 2016.
- B. Status of functioning of Committees constituted by this order.
- C. Action plan for rejuvenation of polluted river stretches.
- D. Action plan for improvement in air quality of non-attainment cities.
- E. Action plan for control of pollution in industrial clusters.
- F. Issues related to sand and gravel mining.
- G. Funds collected under polluters pay principle and its utilization.

A. Compliance of Solid Waste Management Rules, 2016, Plastic Waste Management Rules, 2016 and Bio-Medical Waste Management Rules, 2016.

(i) Solid Waste Management Rules, 2016

Principal Secretary, Urban Administration and Development Department submitted that solid waste and inert waste generated from all the 378 urban local bodies (ULB's) will be disposed through 26 clusters. Sites for all these cluster have been selected and land has been transferred to ULB's. Out of these 378 ULBs:-

- (i) 100 % segregation of waste at source is in practice in 249 ULBs.
- (ii) 100 % door to door collection of the waste is in practice in 364 ULBs.
- (iii) Sites have been selected for common regional sanitary landfills solid waste & inert waste disposal at Indore, Jabalpur, Ujjain, Bhopal and Gwalior having population > 5.00 lakhs.
- (iv) Construction & Demolition Waste is being collected & transported in 284 ULBs.
- (v) Out of 34 towns (population > 1.00 Lakhs), waste processing facilities are fully operational in 18 towns and partially in 16.
- (vi) Out of 344 ULBs (population <1.00 Lakhs), 1779 type of geo-tagged waste processing facilities are operational in 145 towns.
- (vii) Remediation process of old dump site at Indore is completed wherein it is under process at Bhopal and Ratlam.
- (viii) The collection and disposal of waste from the rural areas is to be taken up as per the Solid Waste Management Rules, 2016.

- Chief Secretary directed that gap analysis should be carried out and implementation of provisions of Solid Waste Management Rules, 2016 should be ensured in all 378 ULB's and rural areas.

*(Action: Urban Administration and Housing Department/
Rural Development Department)*

(ii) Plastic Waste Management Rules, 2016

Principal Secretary, Environment informed that:-

- (i) The State Government has imposed complete ban on the production, storage, transportation, sale and use of plastic carry bags in the entire State from 24/5/2017.
 - (ii) All the 21 carry bag manufacturing units are closed at present.
 - (iii) So far, 29 tons of plastic carry bags has been seized through 221 seizures and Rs. 29.75 lakhs have been collected as fine.
 - (iv) Estimated plastic waste generation in MP is 300 MT/D out of which 75 MT/D is Non recyclable plastic waste.
 - (v) Permission has been granted to 11 Cement Industries for safe disposal of non recyclable plastic waste through Co-processing. Till date approx 60,000 MT of plastic waste has been co-incinerated and 500 MT has been used in the road making.
- Chief Secretary directed that sincere efforts should be made to strengthen the work force/ rag pickers for effective collection of non-recyclable plastic waste. Penalty should be imposed on violators as implemented by Indore Municipal Corporation. It was also directed that effective implementation of EPR should be done as per Plastic Waste Management Rules, 2016.

(Action: Urban Administration and Housing Department)

(iii) Bio-Medical Waste Management Rules, 2016

Principal Secretary, Environment informed that:-

- (i) In M.P. 14.20 tons/day Bio-medical waste is being generated out of which 13.60 ton/day is being collected, treated and disposed through the Common Bio-Medical Waste Treatment and Disposal Facilities (CBWTFs).
- (ii) 6793 Health care facilities (HCFs) have been inventorised, which also includes veterinary hospitals, Non-bedded Health care facilities like Dental clinics, Pathology Labs, Dispensaries etc. So far 3601 HCFs have obtained authorization from M. P. Pollution Control Board and other HCFs are in process of obtaining authorization.
- (iii) Board is in process of granting of one time authorization under BMWM Rules, 2016 as amended 2018 to non-bedded health care facilities generating bio-medical waste.
- (iv) At present 11 nos. of Common Bio-Medical Waste Treatment and Disposal Facilities (CBWTFs) are operational for the collection, transportation, treatment and disposal of bio-medical waste.

➤ Chief Secretary directed that;

- Department of Public Health & Family Welfare and Department of Animal Husbandry should review the gap pertaining to authorization of all Govt. Healthcare facilities to ensure collection and treatment of their Biomedical Waste through CBWTFs.

- Bar coded system for collection, quantification and disposal through common facilities of Bio-medical wastes from various health care facilities should be implemented.

(Action: Public Health and Family Welfare, Animal Husbandry and Environment Department)

(B) Status of functioning of Committees constituted by this order

It was informed that following committees have been constituted:-

(a) State Level Committee

First Meeting held on 07.02.2019 under the chairmanship of Hon'ble Mr. Justice K. K. Trivedi.

(b) State Level Advisory Body (SLAB)

Constituted on 13.10.2017 and two meetings held respectively on 16.02.2018 & 11.09.2018.

(c) Special Task Force (STF)

Constituted for all the district.

- The Chief Secretary directed that regular meetings of these committees should take place so as to ensure effective implementation of SWM Rules, 2016.

(Action: Environment Department)

(C) Action plan for rejuvenation of polluted river stretches

Principal Secretary, Environment informed that:-

- (i) Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB) has identified 302 polluted stretches in the country out of which 20 stretches lies in MP.

- (ii) Out of 20 stretches, 04 are declared as priority I & II stretches, i.e. river Khan (Indore), Kshipra (Ujjain), Chambal (Nagda) and Betwa (Mandideep).
- (iii) The main sources of pollution in these river stretches are city sewage and industrial effluent of Indore, Ujjain, Nagda and Mandideep.
- (iv) In Indore, STP of 335 MLD is in operation & 05 STP's having capacity of 67 MLD is proposed. In Ujjain, STP of 53 MLD is operational and STP having capacity of 92 MLD is proposed.
- (v) Similarly, in Nagda, Mandideep and Vidisha STP's of 16 MLD, 12 MLD and 22 MLD are proposed respectively.
- (vi) The remedial action plans of above stretches have been formulated and submitted to CPCB on 30/01/2019, approval of which is awaited.
- (vii) After the approval, the action plans will be implemented through concerned departments & stack holders.

➤ Chief Secretary directed that the concerned departments and stakeholders should start taking measures to mitigate the source of pollution in the river stretches. The Chief Secretary further directed that different component of the action plan should be implemented by the departments once the action plan for the polluted stretches is approved by the Central Pollution Control Board.

(Action: District Administration of respective district, UADD, Forest, WRD, Industry and All concerned department)

(D) Action plan for improvement in air quality of non-attainment cities

Principal Secretary, Environment submitted that:-

- (i) Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB) has identified 102 cities in country as non attainment which are not complying with the ambient air quality standards.
- (ii) Out of 102 non attainment cities, 06 are in MP i.e. Indore, Bhopal, Gwalior, Ujjain, Dewas & Sagar.
- (iii) The main sources of pollution in these are particulate matter (PM10) which is emanating from re-suspension of road dust, vehicular emissions, garbage burning, plying of old commercial vehicles and polluting industries etc.
- (iv) The action plans of above cities have been formulated and submitted to CPCB on 24/12/2018 for approval which is awaited.
- (v) After the approval, the action plans will be implemented through concerned departments and stakeholders.

➤ Chief Secretary instructed the concerned departments to take all possible measures to mitigate the problem and implement the approved action plan in true spirit. The Chief Secretary further directed the transport department to explore the possibility of phasing out 15 years old commercial diesel vehicles and introduction of cleaner fuels (CNG/LNG) for vehicles. He also instructed the department to create a web based vehicular emission checking system to grant PUC certificate.

(Action: District Administration, UADD, Transport, Traffic Police, Industry and all other concerned department)

(E) Action plan for improvement in Polluted Industrial Clusters

Principal Secretary, Environment submitted that:-

- (i) Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB) has identified 100 polluted industrial clusters in the country out of which 04 in MP i.e. Indore, Dewas, Nagda- Ratlam and Pithampur.
- (ii) The action plans for above industrial clusters are to be formulated and submitted to CPCB by March, 2019.
- (iii) Consultation with various stockholders is currently underway and the action plans will be submitted to CPCB in the stipulated time.

- The Chief Secretary directed to start taking measures in the meanwhile so as to reduce the level of pollution. He further instructed to implement the different components of the action plan once it is approved by the CPCB.

(F) Issues related to Sand and gravel mining

It was informed that Mining Department, MP has complied with most of the directions and guidelines of MoEF&CC, GOI pertaining to sand & gravel mining.

- Chief Secretary directed that mining department should ensure compliance of directions of MoEF&CC.

(Action: Mining Department)


(G) Funds collected under polluters pay principle and its utilization

Principal Secretary, Environment informed that under “Polluters pay Principle”, Rs.401 lakhs has been received by MP Pollution Control Board and out of this, Rs. 100 lakhs has been released to CPCB as per the directions of Hon’ble NGT. The remaining amount will be utilized for payment of logistic & honorarium to the committee constituted by Hon’ble NGT. (OA 606/2018, Order dated 16/01/2019) and other pollution abatement activities.

(Action: MP Pollution Control Board.)

In the end, Chief Secretary directed the concerned departments to carryout gap analysis to ensure timely implementation of the action plans. It was also directed that Principal Secretary, Environment would take a periodic review with the officials of UADD on concerned issues. The Chief Secretary further emphasized to ensure complete implementation of all the directions issued by Hon’ble NGT.
